

# Accessibility BINGO

*The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a Civil Rights Law that makes sure that people with disabilities are treated the same and have the same access to the community as people without disabilities. Below are examples of changes that have been made as a result of the ADA.*

Something in the community that is written in braille	Learn what a curb-cut is and find at least 3 in the community	Wheelchair accessible public transportation	Spoken description of visual things on a screen
An elevator that is big enough for a wheelchair or walker to turn around in	Audible crossing signal	Large print documents	Door handles that can be opened with a closed fist without grasping
Closed captioning on a video or show	A ramp into a public building	A sign language interpreter	Handrails in a public bathroom
A service dog in a public place (remember they are working, you should not pet them)	A service desk that a person seated in a wheelchair is able to write on and reach over	Bathroom sink designed so that a wheelchair can pull up under it	Clearly marked accessible parking spots near the entrance of a business
